

## PRESENT PERFECT

Affirmative	Negative	Interrogative
I <b>have visited</b> the beach several times.	I <b>have never visited</b> the beach several times.	<b>Have</b> I <b>ever visited</b> the beach several times? Yes, I have.
You <b>have baked</b> a cake for your mother's birthday.	You <b>have never baked</b> a cake for your mother's birthday.	<b>Have</b> you <b>ever baked</b> a cake for your mother's birthday? Yes, I have.
He <b>has gone</b> to rock concerts.	He <b>has never gone</b> to rock concerts.	<b>Has</b> he <b>ever gone</b> to rock concerts? Yes, he has.
She <b>has seen</b> whales at sea.	She <b>has never seen</b> whales at sea.	<b>Has</b> she <b>ever seen</b> whales at sea? No, she hasn't.
We <b>have stayed</b> at this hotel before.	We <b>have never stayed</b> at this hotel before.	<b>Have</b> we <b>ever stayed</b> at this hotel before? No, we haven't.
They <b>have done</b> a lot of final projects.	They <b>have never done</b> a lot of final projects.	<b>Have</b> they <b>ever done</b> a lot of final projects? No, they haven't.

The present perfect is formed by the verb to *have* + the past participle of another verb. There are two forms of verbs: regular verbs end in *-ed* and irregular verbs that don't follow any pattern, you just have to learn them by heart.
