

RELATIVE PRONOUNS (*WHO*, *WHICH*, *WHOSE*, *THAT*, *WHERE*)

Type	Main clause	Relative pronoun	Relative clause
People	He is the man	<i>who</i>	was my teacher last year.
	We are the ones	<i>that</i>	started the rumor.
Things	This is the fruit	<i>which</i>	tastes great with pancakes.
	Dogs are the pets	<i>(that)</i>	I love the most.
Places	Hidalgo is the state	<i>where</i>	you find the best pastes.
	This is the park	<i>where</i>	my dad likes to cycle.
Possessions	Antonio is the boy	<i>whose</i>	dad is a doctor.
	Those are the students	<i>whose</i>	project won the competition.

- We use relative pronouns to give extra information about people, things, and places.
- We can use the pronoun *that* for people and things and, in these two cases, it is possible to omit the relative pronoun if the relative clause starts with a different subject than the one in the main clause.
