

## PRESENT PERFECT PROGRESSIVE

	Subject	Verb <i>to have + been</i>	Verb ending in <i>-ing</i>	Complement
<b>Affirmative</b>	I / We / You / They	have been	working	since 9:00 a.m.
	He / She	has been	studying	all day long.
<b>Negative</b>	I / We / You / They	haven't been	waiting	for hours.
	He / She	hasn't been	paying attention	in class lately.

Interrogative	Wh-word	Verb <i>to have</i>	Subject	<i>been</i>	Verb ending in <i>-ing</i>	Complement
<b>Yes / No questions</b>		Have	you / we / they	been	answering	emails all morning?
		Has	he / she	been	studying	all night?
<b>Wh-questions</b>	What	have	you / we / they	been	doing	this week?
	Where	has	he / she	been	living	for the last two months?

- The present perfect progressive tense is used to talk about ongoing actions from the past that continue up to the present.
- You can make contractions in the affirmative form, for example:  
**She's** been studying hard. **I've** been working all day.
