**UNEXPECTED
SITUATIONS**

During these difficult times, trust in your ability to think creatively and solve problems. **Rely on** positive emotions to help your brain generate more creative solutions to problems. Let's see how these junior high students handle unexpected situations in their daily lives.

David: On Saturday morning, I took a walk with my dog

Matt: The presentation about the Mayan culture? Was it for today?

Sonia: It is for today. Mr. Flores said last Friday that we had to give our presentation today. He told us “Have everything ready for Monday morning.” Then, I asked you if you could prepare the information at home and you said, “Yes, Sonia. Don’t worry. I’ll prepare it.” Right, Matt? Oh... What happened to your **knee**?

So, how did they deal with unexpected situations?

First, it's important to say that they didn't react impulsively or with fear. They made a pause to reflect and ask for help. In such moments, you must remember that other people have gone through something similar. Talking to people who have been in similar situations can help you feel understood. **Seek** for your family and friend's advice, their support, and their help during tough times. You will see things from a different perspective and you might discover other strategies you hadn't considered before.

Finally, remember that unexpected situations will continue to happen. Surely, the most important matter is to learn how to accept anything you can't control, gain experience, keep moving forward, and, of course, continue to grow.
